CAMPUS CRIME REPORT

The following information regarding security, the sexual misconduct policy and the alcohol and drug use policy are distributed to faculty, staff and students as required by the Student Right to Know and Campus Security Act of 1990 and the Drug Free Schools and Community Act.

The Student Right to Know and Campus Security Act of 1990 and the Amendments to that Act of 1998 and 2008 require educational institutions to make available statistics concerning the occurrence of certain crimes on campus reported to campus public safety personnel or local police agencies. Public Safety and Crime Reporting

Campus Public Safety Office

The Campus Public Safety Office is administered by the Facilities Department, is responsible for the overall security of all campus property and interests, and has written instructions to guide patrolmen in handling public safety operations. The campus public safety patrolmen make nightly inspections of campus lighting and note insufficient or non-working lights on the daily report. Lamps are positioned along main walking paths and at building entrances and are lighted after dark. Bushes, trees and shrubs on campus are pruned regularly, and the grounds department inspects the campus for possible visibility or security problems.

Campus public safety personnel have the authority to question and check the identification of any person on campus in fulfillment of their assigned responsibilities. While on duty they may enter all public areas of the campus, in accordance with their assigned responsibilities, and may call on the Creve Coeur Police Department for the arrest of trespassers or persons involved in criminal activities. Campus public safety personnel check all non-residence buildings several times per day to ensure that they are being locked and unlocked at the appropriate times. They may also issue traffic tickets and warnings as necessary to safeguard the campus community and to ensure orderly use of campus parking lots and traffic lanes. Campus public safety personnel have no authority to make arrests or apprehend violators on or off the campus. All incidents in which arrests and/or apprehension are possible are referred to the Creve Coeur Police.

Reporting Criminal Offenses

If you are a victim of or witness to any on-campus offense, *avoid any actions that might increase the risk to you or to others*. In the event of a life-threatening situation or serious medical emergency, immediately call 911, which would result in the appropriate emergency agency being sent to campus. After calling 911, all students and Covenant personnel should report to the Campus Public Safety Office (392-4111 x2) any crime or security violation. Counseling or victim support services can also be initiated by calling the Campus Public Safety Office.

Covenant Students and personnel are also asked to report non-life threatening criminal actions or potential criminal activity to the Campus Public Safety Office. The Covenant Seminary administration also strongly encourages any member of the campus community who is witness to or victim of a crime to report the incident to local law enforcement. As Covenant Seminary does not operate its own police department, crimes should be reported to the Creve Coeur Police Department (432-8000).

Criminal actions or campus incidents are filed with the Campus Public Safety Office on an Incident Report form. While the rights and privacy of the person reporting the incident will be respected, the Campus Public Safety Office may be required to report certain crime information to local law enforcement. If necessary, certain information may also be disseminated through student mail, faculty/staff newsletters, chapel announcements, the housing department, email, and Portal. Any such announcement would include information designed to aid in the prevention of similar occurrences and to protect the identity of the person reporting.

Reporting Crimes to the Creve Coeur Police

Covenant Seminary is in St. Louis County, and the jurisdictional law enforcement agency is the Creve Coeur Police Department. Covenant Seminary has no official mutual agreement with the Creve Coeur Police Department; however, Covenant Seminary is committed to reporting criminal incidents on campus to the Creve Coeur police and to cooperating fully with the Creve Coeur Police Department on matters that necessitate their intervention. The Campus Public Safety Office will also report to and cooperate with State of Missouri and City of St. Louis law enforcement as necessary.

Voluntary, Confidential Reporting

Covenant Seminary does not provide an anonymous crime reporting service. For further information on reporting crimes see the "Reporting Criminal Offenses" section above.

Professional and Pastoral Counselors Excluded from Reporting Requirements

In order to ensure that victims have access to confidential counseling, professional and pastoral counselors (as defined in Clery Act regulations) are **not** required to report crimes discussed with them in their roles as counselors. Moreover, a school is not required to report statistics relating to crimes that are reported to a pastoral counselor or a professional counselor who is functioning within the scope of his or her license or certification. Covenant Seminary does not explicitly encourage professional and pastoral counselors to inform counselees of the institution's crime reporting procedures described under "Reporting Criminal Offenses" above.

Fire and Medical Emergencies

Covenant Seminary is protected by the City of Creve Coeur for fire protection. Medical emergencies are responded to by the City of Creve Coeur as well as medical centers in the surrounding area.

Emergency Notification and Evacuation

Covenant Seminary has established an electronic email and text message system for the dissemination of emergency information to the campus community. Notifications issued by this system will be sent to each staff or student email address on file with human resources. The system will also send a text message to all students and staff who have opted to participate in the electronic text message system. Students and staff may sign up for the text message system on the Staff and Student Portals or may contact Information Technology Services (392-4111 x4) for assistance.

Upon confirmation of significant emergencies or dangerous situations involving immediate threats to the health or safety of members of the campus community, immediate warnings will be issued to the seminary community through the electronic email and text message system. Only if the warning would compromise efforts to contain the threat, would the release of a warning be delayed. In addition to the electronic email and text message system, other media may be used for emergency notification as the need arises.

Timely Reports

Crimes that are not significant emergencies or immediately dangerous to the campus community, but considered an ongoing security concern for students and staff, will be reported to the campus community in a timely manner. These reports will contain information to aid in the prevention of such crimes. The appropriate means of communicating these reports will be determined on a case by case basis and may include email, Portal, Courier, and chapel announcements.

Campus Security is a Team Effort

Covenant Seminary has an open campus. While this affords freedom of movement for the campus community, it also means that access to campus facilities is not limited to members of the campus community. It is essential that all employees and students take precautions to avoid incidents with unwelcome campus visitors. Anyone who is concerned about the behavior of a visitor on campus should immediately contact campus public safety personnel (392-4111 x2). Students are also urged to keep watch on each other's vehicles and personal possessions and to help control access to the buildings by securing doors and taking notice of strangers in the residence areas.

Building Lockup

Covenant Seminary has on-staff public safety personnel who lock and unlock reserved campus spaces three times daily. Non-residence buildings are locked nightly by campus public safety personnel, and they are unlocked during morning rounds beginning at 7:00. Employees from each department unlock the Library and the Information Technology offices as they arrive for work in the mornings. Non-residence buildings except Edwards Hall and the Library remain locked throughout the day on Saturday, unless they are being used for weekend classes or events. Edwards Hall is

normally open from 8:00-6:00 on Saturdays during the fall and spring semesters. During breaks, holidays, summer and January terms, and to accommodate special events, Edwards Hall hours may vary. All non-residence buildings remain locked throughout the day on Sunday unless they are reserved for an event. Access to these areas after hours is limited to persons who have offices in the buildings or to persons who have obtained permission from appropriate seminary officials or the Campus Public Safety Office. All other persons will be asked to leave the premises; and a report, including names of individuals involved, will be filed by the campus public safety patrolman. Upon receipt of this report, campus public safety staff will initiate the appropriate response.

Access to residential apartments and homes is limited to the residents of the buildings, their guests, and authorized Covenant Seminary personnel who are performing the assigned duties of their position. Keys to residential apartments and homes are issued only to the above parties, and campus residents are urged to lock their doors even when they are home. Residence keys are produced and issued only by the Facilities Department. Under no circumstances are residents or seminary staff members permitted to have keys duplicated or produced by a hardware store, locksmith, or other outside vendor. All seminary personnel are expected to announce themselves prior to entering any residence area. Non-seminary personnel, outside contractors for example, are ordinarily accompanied by seminary staff members when they enter and work in a residence.

Crime Prevention Programs

The Housing Handbook and Student Handbook advise students in procedures to avoid becoming victims of crime and to ensure general safety on campus. These procedures are reemphasized and expanded in mandatory on-campus housing meetings once per year. In order to respond to actual incidents or threats, crime prevention announcements may also be made during weekly chapel announcements and in the weekly school newsletter.

Non-campus Student Organizations

Covenant Seminary does not monitor or recognize any non-campus, student organizations.

Sexual Misconduct Policy

Covenant Theological Seminary affirms that all persons, male and female, are created in the image of God, and therefore are entitled to be treated with honor, respect and love. Jesus Christ provides the supreme model for Christian relationships, requiring treatment of others with love and purity. Sexuality is a good gift of God that enhances the whole of life; yet Scripture expressly limits expression of sexual intimacy to heterosexual, monogamous marriage. Violation of marriage vows through unfaithfulness or un-biblical divorce displeases God and damages others. Sexual intimacy outside marriage also violates God's standards, as may even words, attitudes and thoughts (e.g., pornography). Sexual harassment is therefore also sin, and one that is viewed in our society as a form of discrimination prohibited by federal law.

Sexual misconduct and sexual harassment violate the life of the community and conflict with its purpose. Further, when they involve or become known to those outside the Seminary, they dishonor the name of Christ and of the Seminary. Therefore, these sins will be viewed as serious offenses that will be subject to appropriate disciplinary and other measures.

Allegations of sexual misconduct or harassment will be treated as any other allegations of serious misconduct. Complaints will be immediately and thoroughly investigated. If it is determined that sexual misconduct or harassment has occurred, prompt and appropriate disciplinary action will be taken up to and including termination (of an employee) and/or expulsion (of a student). The Seminary will not retaliate or permit retaliation (including

termination of employment) for an allegation of sexual harassment or misconduct in good faith (i.e., not frivolously, maliciously or with vengeful intent).

For any criminal sexual offense, the sanctions available to the school would include permanent dismissal from the seminary. The seminary may also refer cases to the proper law enforcement authorities for arrest and prosecution. Disciplinary measures will be administered consistent with local, state and federal laws.

Both the accuser and accused are entitled to the same opportunities to have others present during a disciplinary proceeding, and both will be informed of the school's final determination in any school disciplinary proceeding with respect to the alleged sexual offense and any sanction that is imposed against the accused.

Sexual Assault

Reporting

Any victim of rape, acquaintance rape, or other forcible or non-forcible sex offense is strongly encouraged to make a report to the Creve Coeur Police Department (call 911 or 432-8000), or the local law enforcement authorities where the offense occurred. Campus public safety personnel or the Vice-President of Student Development will assist a student in notifying these authorities, if requested. The Vice-President of Student Development may be reached by dialing (314) 392-4010 or (314) 566-9808. Campus public safety personnel may be reached at (314) 392-4111 x2. The victim is strongly encouraged to report the offense to the Campus Public Safety Office.

If medical attention is required, the closest emergency room to the seminary is at St. John's Mercy Medical Center, just east of the seminary on Conway Road. If requested, campus public safety personnel can arrange for transport and someone to accompany you. It is good to remember the importance of preserving evidence for proof of a criminal offense.

Living Arrangements

The seminary will change a victim's academic and living situations after the sex offense if changes are requested by the victim and are reasonably available.

Prevention

The seminary has undertaken a program to promote awareness of sexual misconduct, sexual harassment, rape, acquaintance rape and other forcible and non-forcible sexual offenses. This program is designed to ensure that students and employees of the seminary are well informed regarding these issues and know what actions to take if an offense occurs. Each year a local law enforcement official and/or a trained counselor in sexuality issues will speak on campus at

an open meeting of staff and students. Faculty and other speakers will often speak to sexuality issues at the ministry luncheons sponsored throughout the school year.

Sex Offenders on Campus

Under the Campus Sex Crimes Prevention Act, persons required to register under a state offender registration program must notify the state concerning each post-secondary school at which the offender works or is a student. In Missouri, sex offenders must register with the police department in the city or county in which they live or work. To view or purchase a registry list, contact one of the following:

Alcohol and Drug Use Policy

The seminary prohibits the unlawful possession, use, or distribution of drugs by students and employees. The seminary through its Campus Public Safety Office will involve local law enforcement officials for suspected illegal drug violations on the school's property or as part of the school's activities. Any student charged with possession, use or distribution of illegal drugs will be immediately placed on disciplinary probation pending legal outcome of the charge. If a student is found guilty, it will be recommended that the student be suspended for a time period to be determined according to the seriousness of the offense. Readmission after such an offense will involve evidence of genuine repentance with a disciplinary, probationary status for at least one semester. Other consequences such as non-recommendation for placement and non-awarding of degrees could also result.

The seminary believes that, in view of the widespread abuse of alcohol in our culture, the corporate life of the seminary community is not enhanced by the public use of alcoholic beverages. Hence, consumption of alcoholic beverages in public places on campus is not permitted. This policy is in keeping with the advice of the 1980 and 1983 General Assemblies of the Presbyterian Church in America, stating that although requiring total abstinence "would go beyond the requirements of scripture," the requirements of "love and wisdom ... may lead to

individual decisions to curb or refrain from the use” of alcohol. A student found guilty of violating the explicit prohibitions of this paragraph will be subject to a \$200 fine and may be placed on disciplinary probation for one semester. A second offense could result in a one-semester suspension with mandatory counseling before readmission is considered.

In compliance with federal regulation, the seminary makes available specific information regarding drug and alcohol use and campus security (*Campus Crime Report*) via the Internet at <http://www.covenantseminary.edu/upload/48dd1d6fa94c0.pdf>. A physical copy of this information is available upon request through the Physical Plant or Financial Aid offices. A description of sanctions under local, state, and federal law for possession, use and distribution of illicit drugs and alcohol is attached to the *Campus Crime Report* that is available to all students as described above. Legal Sanctions

Because of the harmful effects of alcohol and drug abuse, local, state and federal governments have enacted laws making it a criminal offense to unlawfully possess, use or distribute illicit drugs or alcohol. These laws cover the "one time," "social" or "recreational" users, as well as the alcoholic and drug addict. In order to assist you in understanding the potential legal implications of such conduct, a summary of the criminal sanctions that may be imposed under local, state and federal laws is provided below.

Alcohol:

Missouri: Any person under the age of 21 who purchases or attempts to purchase or has in his or

her possession any intoxicating liquor is guilty of a misdemeanor and may, upon conviction, be punished by a fine between \$50 and \$1,000 or by imprisonment for up to 1 year, or both. Persons who knowingly furnish alcohol to minors are also guilty of a misdemeanor and subject to the same sanctions.

Illicit Drugs:

The severity of sanctions imposed for both possession and distribution offenses depends on the quantity of drugs, prior convictions, and whether death or serious injury resulted. Sanctions may be increased for offenses that involve distribution to minors or occur on or near Seminary premises. In addition, other federal laws require or permit forfeiture of personal or real property used to illegally possess, facilitate possession, transport or conceal a controlled substance. A person's right to purchase or receive a firearm or federal benefits, such as student loans, grants, contracts, or professional or commercial licenses may also be revoked or denied as a result of a drug conviction.

Missouri Law: The penalty for persons convicted of possession of illicit drugs in Missouri includes a prison sentence up to 7 years and a maximum fine of \$15,000, unless an offense involves smaller quantities (35 GMS. or less), which is punishable from 1 to 3 years in prison and a fine of \$5,000. APPENDIX 2 (cont.)

Alcohol Effects

Alcohol consumption causes a number of marked changes in behavior. Even low doses significantly impair the judgment and coordination required to drive a car safely, increasing the likelihood that the driver will be involved in an accident. Low to moderate doses of alcohol also increase the incidence of a variety of aggressive acts, including spouse and child abuse. Moderate to high doses of alcohol cause marked impairments in higher mental functions, severely altering a person's ability to learn and remember information. Very high doses cause respiratory depression and death. If combined with other depressants of the central nervous system, much lower doses of alcohol will produce the effects just described.

Repeated use of alcohol can lead to dependence. Sudden cessation of alcohol intake is likely to produce withdrawal symptoms, including severe anxiety, tremors, hallucinations, and convulsions. Alcohol withdrawal can be life threatening. Long-term consumption of large quantities of alcohol, particularly when combined with poor nutrition, can also lead to permanent damage to vital organs such as the brain and the liver.

Mothers who drink alcohol during pregnancy may give birth to infants with fetal alcohol syndrome. These infants have irreversible physical abnormalities and mental retardation. In addition, research indicates that children of alcoholic parents are at greater risk than other youngsters of becoming alcoholics.
